Free School Meals

You may be eligible for funding for a hot lunch. In addition, school may access funding through Pupil Premium Grant. The pupil premium is extra money for schools to help disadvantaged pupils of all abilities achieve their full potential. School receives £ 1,480 towards extra support for eligible children. When you are eligible for free meals, this grant is also given to school. All children in Reception up to Yr 2 may access a free hot meal. However, only those applying through Suffolk for Free School Meals will trigger the additional funding to school. There is an online checker available on the Suffolk Website to see if you are eligible.




St Louis Sports Stars Through to the County Final


All Saints School and St Louis Fundraise for Patrick

Why is reading in the early years so important?

1. Cognitive development

Put simply, reading stimulates brain cells. It acts as a "workout" for the brain as it stimulates imagination, critical thinking and language skills. The more stimulation the brain receives, the more connections it builds

which in turn lays the foundations for later academic success.

The more variety in the books and stories read, the more cognitive development!



2. Later academic success

As mentioned, the cognitive development associated with reading will contribute towards academic success. When children engage in reading from an early age, they improve their general knowledge and language skills and also improve their attention spans and concentration. The latter two are crucial for later schooling.

Additionally to all of these factors, confidence gained through early reading is important to instil a love of learning which will benefit children throughout school.

3. Psychological benefits

Perhaps an often overlooked benefit of reading in the early years are the psychological benefits this can have. Reading and being read to allows children to explore empathy and thus facilitates emotional development. Certain characters and storylines will encourage children to think critically about emotions and feelings whilst in a safe and controlled environment.

4. Self-confidence

Often children can feel pressure when learning new skills in school, particularly if perhaps they feel they are developing at a slower pace than their peers. This can have wider implications for their self-image and thus impact the way they learn and feel about school moving forward. This is one of the key reasons why reading at an early age is so important. Starting to read with your child early on will encourage them to learn at their own pace in a safe environment and will improve their self-confidence amongst peers.

5. Enhanced Communication

• Naturally, early reading will contribute towards children's vocabulary and knowledge but it also increases the exposure children have to the



Handwriting

The school font for handwriting is letter join and children have handwriting practice to help them develop joined up handwriting. Most Year 4 children use a pen. Mrs White checks their consistent presentation before awarding this.

Children aim to write in a consistent size, following the letter formation taught. Once they achieve fluency, their brains are able to move on to focus upon what they write, rather than how they are writing. It is always helpful to practice at home too, to build the stamina and proficiency to meet the required standards. In Year 6, children must join their letters to be secure in their writing skills



because this is a government set standard. The letter-join website includes videos that describe how to form eat letter in detail. There are also practice sheets to use at home.

Please ask your children's class teacher for help if you wish to login to the site and are having any difficulties.

Letter-join whole school handwriting scheme

Letter-join is a whole school handwriting scheme offering a combination of traditional and digital resources.

These include classroom presentations, handwriting activities, online games and hundreds of worksheets using either a printed font, or a cursive font with or without a lead-in line. A school subscription includes free use for your pupils at home.

Crossing Rayes Lane and Fordham Road Safely

Where there is a pavement or footway, use it. Take care when crossing cycle and horse lanes on the road.
Cyclists may be travelling quietly but can be faster than other traffic. If you are looking after someone younger than you, always hold their hand when on the road.

Remember to look both ways.

- 1. Find a safe place to cross.
- 2. 2. Stop just before you get to the kerb.
- 3. Look all around for traffic and listen.
- 4. If traffic (horses too) are coming, let them pass.





ONLINE CONTENT 10 tips to keep your children safe online

The internet has transformed the ability to access content. Many apps that children use are dependent on user-generated content which can encourage freedom of expression, imagination and creativity. However, due to the sheer volume uploaded every day, it can be difficult for platforms to regulate and moderate everything, which means that disturbing or distressing images, videos or audio clips can slip through the net. That's why we've created this guide to provide parents and carers with some useful tips on keeping children safe online.



MONITOR VIEWING HABITS

Whilst most apps have moderation tools, inappropriate content can still slip through the net.



CHECK ONLINE CONTENT

Understand what's being shared or what seems to be 'trending' at the



CHECK AGE-RATINGS

Make sure they are old enough to use the app and meet the recommended age-limit.



CHANGE PRIVACY SETTINGS

Make accounts private and set content filters and parental controls where possible.



SPEND TIME ON THE APP

Get used to how apps work, what content is available and what your child likes to watch.



LET CHILDREN KNOW YOU'RE THERE

Ensure they know that there is support and



ENCOURAGE CRITICAL THINKING

Talk about what people might post online and why some posts could cause distress.



LEARN HOW TO REPORT & BLOCK

Always make sure that children know how to use the reporting tools on social media apps.



KEEP AN OPEN DIALOGUE

offer reassurance.





SEEK FURTHER SUPPORT

If a child has been affected by something they've seen online, seek support from your school's safeguarding lead.
