#### **Step into Spring**


Dear Friend and Colleagues,



#### New Member of the Board of Directors - Sue Price

I am delighted and honoured to join the Board of Directors for Our Lady of Walsingham Trust. I work for the Margaret Beaufort Institute (MBI) where the main focus of my work is providing Pastoral Supervision to those in ministry, teaching the Children's Spirituality Module for the MA in Chaplaincy and Pastoral Care and being the link between the Diocese and the Institue for the Diocesan Commission for Formation and Catechesis.



I have what is now called a serial vocation in my career development. I started off by training as a middle school teacher. Unfortunately, that was not the best career choice for me and having spent 6 years trying to learn how to teach, was fortunate to be able to re-train as an Occupational Therapist, a career I loved. I spent nearly 30 years in Healthcare, specialising in Children's Occupational Therapy. At the same time, I had a hunger and desire to study theology, which I did through the Margaret Beaufort Institute, ending up studying for and being awarded a PhD, which focused on the silent spirituality of severely disabled children.

Although I was no longer a teacher, my teaching experience was invaluable when visiting schools to support children in a variety of ways in school. I am very well aware of the current issues and needs of SEND children and the incredible work that is going on through out the trust to support this particular group of children. I know that five years ago, many of these children would have had places in special schools and that the current demand for these places exceeds what is available.

Over the years, through various routes I have had many connections with schools in the Diocese. MBI was tasked by Bishop Alan Hopes with providing a CCRS Lite version which we called the Diocesan Certificate in Catholic Studies (DCCS). I was responsible for its delivery which we did in person for a few years. With Andy Stone's help, this has now become the Introductory Certificate in Catholic Studies, available via the Anspear app. For me, it was a delight to see how people found the course helpful and informative. The feedback continues to indicate that this is a valuable course, especially for those teachers new to teaching in Catholic Schools.

I hope I bring to the Board an understanding of the demands, joys, challenges and expectations of all those involved in teaching, along with a concern for their well-being. I am very happy to visit schools to share in those demands, joys and challenges. I look forward to supporting the ongoing development of the trust, through living out, with all those concerned, the motto of Christ at the Centre, Children at the Heart.

Over the past year, we have worked very hard to enhance our arts provision, offering enriching opportunities in music, drama, dance, and visual arts. From engaging workshops with a local ceramicist to memorable musical performances, our students have demonstrated their passion and talent across various creative disciplines.

Our commitment to the arts goes beyond the classroom, with exciting collaborations, partnerships, and extracurricular activities that allow our pupils to explore and express their creativity including Choir, dance, Art and drama clubs. This achievement highlights the importance of artistic expression in education and the positive impact it has on students' confidence, well-being, and academic success.







Some examples over the past two years of extra-curricular activities the school has offered or participated in are art club, story-telling club, street dance group who performed to attendees of our summer fete, we re-established the choir – who practiced to perform: in our neighbouring sheltered accommodation, at the Celebrations concert at Snape Maltings, and in Latin for Bishop Peter.

We have reached out from school to the wider community, by becoming involved with the volunteers of a nearby community garden learning from those in our neighbourhood about plants, nature and the benefits of voluntary work. We also sang to and made Christmas cards for pensioners in sheltered accommodation and linked up with children in another Catholic school in Liverpool, drawing them pictures and writing to them about us and asking them about their lives in Liverpool.

We would like to extend a heartfelt thank you to everyone who has contributed to this achievement, especially Ms Hughes, and our talented students, supportive parents, and dedicated staff. This is just the beginning of our journey, and we are excited to continue our journey, hopefully, to achieving the Gold Artsmark in the future.

# How Moving on Up is the Focus for St Louis Children's Personal Development

St Louis has developed a comprehensive, whole school approach to supporting the personal development of all children in school from Nursery to Year 6. This was recently recognised by Ofsted who found the school's delivery of personal development to be Outstanding. Co-chairs of Governors, Bethan Byrne and Marc Walker explained that the whole school ethos was that every child should be responsible, respectful and engaged in the life of school, the local community and the wider world.

Ofsted reported that, "The school's provision for pupils' personal development is exceptional. The school takes every possible opportunity to enhance pupils' cultural awareness. This focus threads through the whole curriculum, emphasising the themes of love, respect and tolerance."

From joining us in Nursery to leaving for Secondary School, our focus is encouraging all of our children to be emotionally, socially and physically successful so that they lead healthy, safe and fulfilled lives. Even the quietest child steps up to the daily helping hand in Reception, taking the register and supporting the class teacher throughout the say. By Year 6, our children have become confident, resilient, active and engaged citizens who contribute to the local community and wider world.

On Shrove Tuesday, our School Chaplains and Mini Vinnies cooked and served pancakes for residents at Brampton Manor Boutique Care Home, sharing experiences together.







Food is also a theme in our nurture cooking groups, where children come together to chat and make friendships whilst gaining confidence and independence weekly after school. Others develop residence and team building skills in our afterschool Forest School Club.

In response to the wellbeing needs of children, we have staff trained in Lego Therapy, Drawing and Talking and Play Therapy. This means that we can response quickly to emerging needs of children.

After school clubs are timetabled to incentivise invited children to keep attending school every day, supporting our record of high attendance.

Christ at the Centre,

Our School Chaplains are role models to others, representing school both offsite and on and developing and leading Friday Assemblies. We take our Chaplains to lead assembly at the neighbouring All Saints C of E school



and their prayer leaders make a return visit to St Louis. This helps them to be confident speakers. Sports Leaders, Play Leaders and Buddy Readers all inspire younger children to aim high.

Located in Newmarket, we are fortunate to benefit from many horseracing related industry contacts and those from the scientific community. During science week, children aspired to be scientists helped by seeing live robots in action, DNA extracted from strawberries and speaking with a consultant anaesthetist and a food scientist. Children in Year 5 learn about the racing industry and visit the Racing Museum. Each year, twenty children are chosen to ride for a week at Newmarket Pony Academy, where they gain skills in resilience and gain much confidence. Nervous starters become confident trotters after five days and all come away understanding the science around caring for horses.

Our oversubscribed Mini Vinnies Group meet weekly and outreach in the community, lead CAFOD fundraising, deliver events during Fairtrade Fortnight and connect with the Parish SVP group. They have prepared Easter cards for the elderly and sold quiz sheets during Lent. The group also corresponds with Patrick, an eight-year-old, that our families fund to educate in Uganda. Patrick sets us a great standard for smart handwriting. These children demonstrate how working together as a socially responsible community, we can share our skills and talents for the benefit of others.

Teamwork is something we develop through sport. As a member of the Forest Heath Sports Partnership, all children experience competitive sport with Suffolk schools. Most recently, we celebrating coming fifth out of over eighty schools in the County Athletics



Competition. Our SEND learners especially enjoy their Mini Olympic Competitions and return proudly to show us their winning medals.

We have strong links with Suffolk Police and Bill Butcher, our PCSO is a familiar face to our children. He helps deliver important life skills messages from risks of involvement in County Lines, knife safety PCSO Bill Butcher shares advice about staying safe online It is always sad to see children move on to their next class or onto a new school, but every year, children successfully grow from the many



personal development opportunities. Teachers and families are equally proud to see each small steps taken in building confident and independent learners, knowing that everyone plays a part in supporting them to lead fulfilled lives.

During the week of the 3rd February each class completed activities focusing on mental health awareness. The focus this year was `growing`. Within our classes we completed activities such as creating our own islands of personality, where we considered what makes us unique. As well as this we thought about how we can look after our own mental health, acknowledging what we like to do and what allows us to find some calm throughout our day. We took time to appreciate that we all have mental health and some

days it may require more support than others!

#### Ignite Training Morning




# Bishop Alan Opens the Sisters of St Louis Wellbeing Hub



He spoke about how he was inspired to write and how poetry is a living breathing activity not something old and dusty in a book. He had great advice for his young fans – stories don't have to be hard work. A great story can be short with the right choice of words.

There were plenty of opportunities for audience participation with No Breathing in Class and the Hand on the Bridge. After the reading and questions, some children had books signed by Rosen and were delighted to see their own names in his distinctive hand.

They gave the event a keen review

"He made me laugh. I liked the poem about the dog when he couldn't open the bag."

"It was good because we watched a show and I hadn't seen a show before. He let us ask questions."

"He was tall and he made me happy rather than making me laugh."

"He told funny stories about chocolate cake and a dog like an onion."

#### Children's Mental Health Week





### Opening of the Jubilee Year of Hope

Throughout the day, over 900 entries were made by staff and students on their hopes and aspirations for the Jubilee Year on the letters that would form hope. Mr Jon Hicks, Head of RE organised this with the support of the school chaplain and the Art department.



Mr Hicks commented "It was a fantastic way to get the students involved with the opening of the Jubilee in schools. It worked very well as this was the first time we have tried something like this. It was great seeing the student's reactions to comments on affecting the world and to reflect on they see as being important both on a local, national and international level".

It was a cross-community event that brought everyone together for reflecting on the need of Hope and reflecting on how the face of Christ can be made known through thoughts, words and actions which can truly form a community of hope.

#### **Seeding Hope Greener Ventures**

On Thursday 23rd January representatives from the student chaplaincy team visited Elm Tree Primary School in Lowestoft. St Alban's Catholic High School raised the funds through 'Discover the World' to plant 1000 new trees. The conditions were that these new tree saplings needed to be planted in Suffolk. After much discussion it was decided the trees would be planted at Elm Tree Primary school due to their land availability.



The school is just shy of having 15 acres of field space! Our students had a fantastic day, and they proudly planted approximately 50 trees. The day was in partnership with 'Seeding Hope Greener Ventures'. We were also invited into the school to enjoy a hot chocolate and learn more about the company and greener futures. The local mayor and a team of local press were there on the day and captured the brilliant work that was taking place. It was a special day that raised awareness of the importance of afforestation and supports the work of Pope Francis, caring for our environment and our planet.

#### Cambridge University Lectures

This year we have been lucky enough to attend a series of Physics lectures at the Cavendish Laboratories which is part of the University of Cambridge. The lectures start at 6pm which gives us plenty of time to drive up in the school minibus after school. Beginning in October and running until March the talks are aimed at enthusiastic science students. The topics covered this year have been wonderfully varied: the biomechanics of the foot, the formation of planets around other stars, the use of AI in medicine, the Higgs boson, room acoustics and satellite imaging. We have tended to arrive with a bit of time to spare and students have been able to explore the Cavendish museum, try their hand at some Isaac Physics problems or simply eat biscuits and drink squash. There is always something in each talk to stretch young minds and enthuse students with the application of science to the real world.

#### Sixth Form Delves into Democracy

Our Sixth Form students recently embarked on an enriching trip to the heart of British politics, attending a prestigious politics conference held within the historic walls of Westminster Hall. The day was a whirlwind of insightful talks, lively debate, and a firsthand glimpse into the workings of our government.

The conference boasted an impressive lineup of speakers, representing a diverse spectrum of political view-



points. Students had the unique opportunity to hear from prominent figures such as Sir Jacob Rees-Mogg, offering insights into conservative perspectives, and Lord Dubs, who shared his powerful experiences and advocacy on refugee rights. Daisy Cooper MP provided a perspective from the Liberal Democrats, and Alastair Campbell gave a fascinating look into the world of political communication and strategy.

The real highlight of the day was the interactive Q&A sessions. Our students were encouraged to engage directly with the speakers, posing thoughtful and challenging questions. #### MFL Debating

In February, two of our Year 13 students represented St Benedict's Sixth Form in the regional heat of the 'Joutes Oratoires', the national MFL debating competition organised by l'Institut Français. Jagoda Napieraj and Bea Price had to prepare three motions -

- Les anciennes puissances coloniales ont le devoir de restituer les artefacts culturels aux pays africains francophones (Former colonial powers have a duty to return cultural artifacts to French-speaking African countries).
- Le bénévolat est essentiel pour maintenir la cohésion sociale aujourd'hui. (Volunteering is essential to maintaining social cohesion today).
- Les plateformes comme TikTok ont un rôle positif à jouer dans la démocratie en renforçant la participation des jeunes. (Platforms like TikTok have a positive role to play in democracy by strengthening youth participation).

Students had to prepare two minute presentations both for and against each of the motions as they didn't know until the last minute which side of the motion they had to defend. Immediately afterwards, they conduct a four minute 'strife' against each of their opponents where arguments go back and forth between the competitors, and then finally a conclusion is presented to the adjudicators. All this in French. Bea and Jagoda did very well, beating Framlingham College but loosing out to Hills Road, but only by two points. Both were commended for their fluency, quality of language and ideas. Bravo!
